

**I. Discussion with idioms:**

1. If you “throw in the towel” you quit. You give up. Describe a time when you threw in the towel.
2. If you are “thin-skinned” you are easily upset or hurt. You are sensitive to criticism. Would you describe yourself as thin-skinned. Is your spouse more thin-skinned than you are?
3. If you “swallow your pride” you forget your pride and accept something humiliating (something that humbles you). Sometimes, I have had to swallow my pride and admit to my husband that I was wrong. Don't we all hate admitting error! Describe a time when you had to swallow your pride.
4. A “standing joke” is a subject that regularly causes amusement. For example, in my family, my son's lateness is a standing joke. One time we were waiting outside his apartment to take him to dinner. We called to see if he was ready. He said he was “heading out the door”. My husband asked, “Have you gotten in the shower yet?”. My son answered, “I'm just getting into the shower now.” Then we understood we were in for a long wait. Now whenever we call to check on our son when he is late, we ask, “Have you gotten into the shower yet?” That is a standing joke. What are the standing jokes in your family?
5. A “Mecca” for something is a place that is frequently visited by a particular group. It comes from Mecca, the religious center of Islam. People might say, “New York city is a Mecca for theatre goers.” Austin is a live music Mecca. What is your town known for or famous for? Explain why I should visit there.

**II. Unusual Conjunctions:**

She talks about Jim as if she loves him. It looks as if it will snow. As if the flood wasn't bad enough, now they have to deal with rattlesnakes looking for a new burrow. Jill got invited to her party and I didn't. As if I care!

Yet:

Jim's plays basketball very well, yet his favorite sport is tennis. The visitors complained about the heat, yet they continued to spend hours in the sun each day.

But for:

But for my uncle's help, I wouldn't be here today. But for her kindness, I would have gone hungry.

Even though:

Even though I ate a big breakfast this morning, I'm looking forward to a large lunch. Even though he made good grades, he couldn't get in the university.

If only:

If only we had worn our raincoats, we wouldn't be soaking wet now. If only I could go on vacation with you. If only he would call us. Then we wouldn't worry about him.

Rather than:

Rather than study grammar, let's just practice conversation. We ought to invest in machinery rather than buildings.

But instead:

He talked of going to Greece, but instead he visited Turkey.

He wanted to ask out Emma, but instead he went to a movie by himself.
