Conversation Practice

A man enters an English class. The teacher introduces herself.

Woman: Hello, I'm Bobbi Sue. What's your name?

Man: My name is Eduardo Mario Hernandez.

Woman: What name do you go by?

Man: Just call me Ed.

Woman: It's nice to meet you, Ed. Welcome to our class.

1. What is the man's full name?
2. What is the name he goes by? Some people have "nicknames". A nickname is often a shorter form of your actual name. For example, my name is Catherine. But I go by Cathy. Cathy is my nickname.
3. Introduce yourself to the students on each side of you.
4. Tell your full name and your nickname.

The conversation continues.

Woman: Where are you from Ed?

Man: I am from Colombia. I live here in the United States now.

Woman: How long have you been here?

Man: I moved here six weeks ago.

Woman: That's not very long. How are you getting along in the U.S.?

Man: Not very well. My English is not good. I need help with my English.

Woman: You have come to the right place, Ed. Welcome to our English class.

Woman: We have two levels of classes. We have intermediate and advanced. Which class would you like to join?

Man: I need the beginner class.

Woman: We don't have a beginner class. We only have intermediate and advanced. You can start in the intermediate class.

Man: I will try that.

Woman: Let me introduce you to Olivia. Olivia is from Mexico. She speaks Spanish. She can help you understand the teacher.

Man: Thank you. I will go at once.

Ed: Yes. I don't speak much English. I will try to learn English in your class.

Teacher: That's fine. Sit over there. Pull your chair into the circle. Open your book to page 200. Read the paragraph at the top of the page. Point to the picture of the car.
