That boy lifted my wallet. My wallet was lifted also.

Lift can also be a noun.

a-something that lifts cars: Put the car on the lift so I can change the tires. He put the car on the lift.

b-a ride: Can you give me a lift to class? I gave grandmother a lift downtown.

c-an elevator (British): Take the lift to the fifth floor. I took the lift to the top floor.

If you send emergency supplies into a place by plane, it is an **airlift**.

The U.S. airlifted supplies to Japan after the earthquake.

The airlift will help people.

Face surgery to improve your looks is a **facelift**.

Many movie stars have a facelift.

I will get a facelift when I am old.
