IV. What is the difference between the verb “want” and the verb “need”?

If you want something, you would like to have it. If you need something, you must have it. For example, you want a new dress. You do not need a new dress. You have five dresses in your closet. Your baby needs milk.

Teachers: Make two lists on the board (I want) and (I need). Ask the students to give examples of each.

V. What is the difference between the verb “buy” and the verb “spend”?

You buy things. You spend money. You cannot spend things or buy money.

Example: Mary buys food at the market. Mary spends all her money on food.

Teachers: Have the students to write a sentence with “buy” and one with “spend”.
