Use have to when something is necessary and you have no choice.

Example: The museum isn't free. You have to pay \$5 to enter.

Debbie has to take her exam next Monday.

Use don't have to when it is not necessary.

I don't have to work on Saturdays.

We don't have to go to the party if you don't want to.

You don't have to do the extra homework.

Idioms with HAVE

1-If you **have a feeling** that something will happen, you know in advance about it. For example: I have a feeling it will rain tomorrow. I have a feeling my daughter will get married soon. Another name for this is "intuition". Many times we feel like we know something will happen before it does. Do you have feelings like this sometimes?

2-If you **have a green thumb**, you can grow plants really well. Ex: My mother has a green thumb. Her garden has big green plants with vegetables on them. She grows plants well. Do you have a green thumb?

3-If you **have a lot on your mind**, you have many things to worry about. Ex: Stop asking me so many questions. I have a lot on my mind right now. I can't talk to you. Do you have a lot on your mind right now?

4-If you **have bad luck**, you are not lucky. Ex: I tried to get that job, but I had bad luck. The man who came in just before me got the job. Tell about a time when you had bad luck.
