

I. What are phrasal verbs?

Phrasal verbs have two parts: a verb (get, go, take, have) and an adverb or preposition (up, on, down) Americans use many phrasal verbs. Study these examples.

1.get up

I get up at 6 every morning. This morning I got up at 8.

2.get along (are friendly)

My friend and I get along well.

3.turn on

He turns on the TV every morning?

She turned on the lights in the kitchen.

4.turn off

Turn off the lights when you leave.

5.turn down

Turn down the TV. It is too loud.

She turned down my invitation.

Turn down the bed for the kids.

6.go on (what's happening)

What's going on here?

7.go off (ring or make noise)

My alarm clock went off at 5 AM.

It usually goes off at 6.

8.come on (hurry)

Come on. We're late!

Come on over to my house.

9.put on

It's cold outside. Put on your coat.

Put on your shoes.

10.take off

Take off your shoes in the house.

The plane takes off at 2PM.

11.give up (stop trying)

Don't give up. You can learn English.
