### GET

- We use the verb get with adjectives. Examples: It's getting dark. It's getting cloudy. He's getting tired.  
The baby's getting sleepy. She is getting so big! She's getting wet. I am getting ready.
- We use "get" with nouns. Examples: I want to get an A on the test. I want to get a job. She is going to the store to get some milk.
- We use "get to" to mean arrive or reach. Examples: How do I get to the airport? When you get to the airport, call me.
- You can get married, get divorced, get engaged but not get born or get dead. EX: David and Jan are getting married in June.
- You can get back to mean return home. Example: When you get back, call me. Cathy will get back in late May. What time did you get back?
- You can get back at someone if you want revenge. Example: Todd got back at James for telling him a lie.
- If you get sick, you become ill. If you get the point, you understand what someone is saying. If you get a joke, you understand what is funny. If you get a shock, you are surprised at something. If you get an idea, you think of something creative.
