Jane: How old are you?

Jim: I am sixty seven years old.

Jane: Are you the first child in your family?

Jim: No, I am the second child. I have an older sister.

Jane: Are you the second person in your family named Jim?

Jim: No, I am the third person named Jim. My name is Jim Bob Jones, III (the third). My father is Jim Bob Jones, Jr. (junior).

Sally: Do you have children?

Jane: I have three children. My oldest child is a girl. She is nine. I also have **twin** boys. They are 7.

Sally: I only have one girl. She is fourteen. She is an **only child**.

Questions:

1. How many children does Jane have?
2. Who has twins?
3. Who has an only child?

Twins are two babies born at the same time. Triplets are three babies born at the same time. Four children is quadruplets, five is quintuplets, six is sextuplets.

Do you know anyone with twins or triplets?

Do you agree: It is good to have twins.

A **pair** is two things that go together. EX: a pair of socks, a pair of gloves, a pair of shoes.

Sometimes we say pair for one thing: EX: a pair of scissors, a pair of glasses, a pair of pants, a pair of shorts, a pair of fingernail clippers.

A **couple** of socks are two socks that don't go together. A couple is two people who are married. A **single** person is not married. If you go alone, you go **solo**.

If you want one of something, you want a **single** one. If you want **twice** as much, you ask for **double**.

Double is two of something. EX: I had a bad headache. I took a **double dose** of aspirin. **Triple** is three times as much.
