I. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Monday, January 19th was a holiday. It was MLK day. MLK stands for Martin Luther King. Martin Luther King was a black minister who fought against racism and discrimination. At that time in America blacks and whites could not use the same facilities. There were separate churches, schools, swimming pools, neighborhoods and even public restrooms. Those for blacks were seldom equal to those for whites. America was a segregated nation.

Martin Luther King was an inspiration to the civil rights movement. He led sit-ins to desegregate lunch counters and restaurants. He led boycotts of businesses that would not serve black people. He led marches demanding equal treatment for black people. He delivered a speech called "I Have a Dream." A famous line from the speech is, "I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character." Martin Luther King was assassinated in 1968 because of his views on equality for blacks.

Martin Luther King probably could not imagine that less than 50 years after his speech, America would elect a black man as president. Still there are many people in America who are prejudiced against people of another race or religion. This is a problem that America continues to fight.
