## FUMC ESL 2-19-2015 Advanced Lesson

Class Discussion: Students choose one of the questions. Read it to the class. Answer it. Ask the other group members their opinion.

- 1. When you "take something upon yourself", you choose to do it. To "take charge" of it. What is something you take upon yourself to do in your household? Are you a "take charge" kind of person, or do you keep silent and let others take charge?
- 2. If someone "takes credit" for something, they say that they did something good. Have you ever had a boss "take credit" for work that you did? Do you think that happens often in the business world?
- 3. If you can't "take a joke" you don't appreciate humor directed at you. For example: James took my stapler and tape dispenser. He hid them in another office and watched me look for them. When he finally showed me where they were, he laughed and said that was a good joke. I didn't think it was funny at all. I wasted a lot of time looking for my things. I told him I was angry. He said, "You just can't take a joke." Would you have thought this was funny? Do you like to play jokes on people? Do you think you have a good sense of humor? What would you do if someone told you an inappropriate joke?
- 4. If someone is "taken down a peg", they are humbled. Can you think of any time when a teacher or boss "took someone down a peg"? How would you take someone down a peg?
- 5. If you "take on more than you can handle" you overcommit yourself. Do you ever do this? On most days do you find you have more work than you can do, or do you have lots of spare time?

Pronunciation Practice-Teachers say one of the words in the box. Have the students circle the word you said. (you should circle them too, so you don't forget what you said) Afterwards have the students pronounce every word in each box.
