Most words spelled with EA in the middle have the same vowel sound as words with EE in the middle. Having the same vowel sound doesn't mean they rhyme. They need the same vowel and ending sound to rhyme. Notice that the examples have the same vowel sound, but not all of them rhyme. EX: meet - meat speech - speak teach - speech
