IN	We use in with months - in May seasons - in winter country - in Greece city or town names - in New York times of the day - in the morning, afternoon or evening BUT at night!
ON	We use "on" with specific days - on Friday, on New Year's Day, on April the 19th American English - "on the weekend OR on weekends"
AT	We use "at" with specific times - at 7 o'clock, at 6.15 at night specific places in a city - at school British English - "at the weekend OR at weekends"
TO	We use "to" with verbs which show movement such as go and come - He goes to school. She returned to the store. They are coming to the party tonight.

*NOTE: Use **to** for most places. But do not use a preposition with **home**. Example: We are going **to** Mexico next month. We are going home next month. Do **NOT** say: We are going **to** home. We say: We returned home. NOT We returned to home.*

Vocabulary: Many words in English have a noun form and verb form. For example, "work" is a verb, but "worker" is a noun. "Call" is a verb, but "caller" is a noun. In the slide show you will watch, the word "laundry" is a noun and "laundress" is a verb.
