Introduce yourself. Tell where you are from and where you live now. Finish this sentence: Next year, I plan to go...

Using Go: (GO, WENT, GONE)

A. You can **go out, go up, go down, go to, go with**

Examples:

Let's **go out** tonight. I don't want to cook.

Go up the stairs and turn left.

Go down the hill and turn the corner.

He **goes** to town every day.

I **will go** with Mother tomorrow.

B. We use **be going to** to talk about future plans

Examples:

I **am going to move** to Dallas.

We **are going to meet** Sam for lunch.

They **are going to stay** at our house.

Ben **is going to** college in January.

Sara **is going to** a dance

C. Past tense of go is **went**. The past participle of go is **gone**. For present perfect tense we use **have/has gone**. Ex: He **has gone** to the bank. They **have gone** on vacation

Make a sentence with have gone and has gone.

D. We often use **go** with **gerunds**. **Gerunds** are words that look like verbs, but are used in the sentence as nouns. EX: We **go** swimming every Saturday. In this sentence **go** is the verb and swimming is a gerund. Compare with this sentence: Ben **is swimming** in the pool. In this sentence is swimming is the present continuous verb.

Examples:

We **are going fishing** next week.

He **is going climbing** in the Rocky Mountains.

They **are going hiking**. You should go with them.

E. We sometimes use **go** to talk about **position**. EX: Where do these plates go? They go on the shelf in the dining room. We use **go** to mean **to fit**. EX: There are too many bags. They **won't go** in the trunk of the car. We use **going** to talk about **change**. EX: Her hair **is going gray**. The company **is going bankrupt**.

F. You can **go hungry, go crazy, or go wild**.

Examples:

Children all over the world **go hungry** every day.

I will **go crazy** if I don't see my boyfriend soon.

The dogs **went wild** when we let them out of the pen.

G. **Go** can mean **to match**. EX: Do these shoes **go with** this dress? That red sweater **doesn't go** with your purple pants.

Conversations with GO. Read and explain their meaning.

Abby: We'd better go now. It's almost 3 PM. I have to pick up the kids at 3:30.

Bella: I had no idea it was that late! **Where does the time go?**

Cal: **How does that song go?** I can't remember the tune.

Deb: It's the same tune as Row, Row, Row your Boat.

Erin: I don't know how to **go about** fixing this computer.

Frankie: My sister, Sara, is a computer repair person. She is going to help you fix it tomorrow.

Ben: My name is Benjamin, but I **go by** Ben.

Ric: That's interesting. My name is Ricardo, but I go by Ric.

Gail: Two months **went by** before the policeman caught the burglar.

Haley: I am glad they caught him.

Isabella: Is this the line for the movie?

Jackie: Yes it is. I'm waiting on someone, you can **go ahead of** me.

Kelsey: The flu virus is **going around**.

Lyn: Are you going to get a flu shot?

Maggie: The birthday cake looks delicious. Do we have enough cake to **go around?**

Nora: Yes. The cake serves 10 and there are only 6 children coming to the party. We will have cake left over.

Olivia: My wife and I have been working really hard. We need a vacation. We're **going away** next weekend.

Pat: Who will keep your kids?

Olivia: My parents are going to keep them.

Rose: Mom, I'm going to try to get all A's this year.

Mother: **Go for it!**

Sandy: The power **went off** during the freeze.

Teresa: Ours did too. It was off for hours. Our power **goes off** a lot.

Vince: What was that noise?

Will: I don't know. The kids are in the basement. It sounds like they broke something. "Hey kids, What's **going on** down there?"

Daughter: It's **going on** six o'clock and Dad still hasn't called.

Mother: Yes, I'm a little worried. He usually calls by now.

Ashley: Nell's father died this week. Her mother died 3 months ago. And her 3 year old fell and broke his arm on Wednesday

Brenda: Poor Nell. She's **gone through** some tough times this year.

Amy: Do you think we can **go without** a car while we are in Austin?

Cindy: It's hard to **go without** a car here. There is no subway and there aren't many buses.

Pronouncing the OO sound. Teachers, make the OO sound and ask them to make it. Notice this sound is different from the long U sound in words like "value" and "argue". Practice saying these words:

pool	noon	food	school	soon	tool
boot	room	roof	too	tooth	loose

U or UE can make this same sound
