Put On- can be separated

I **put on** socks every day because my feet get cold. I put on lotion first, then **put on** the socks.

Can you **put** sunblock **on** my back?

I have **put on** weight since Covid.

If you're cold, **put on** a coat.

I **put** a blanket **on** the bed in case you get cold.

Assign parts for **Narrator**, **Mother**, **Little Red Riding Hood**, **Grandmother**, **Wolf**, **Woodchopper**
