### **Holding the Bag: Chapter 4: Remembering**

### **More Phrasal Verbs**

We studied some phrasal verbs (verb + adverb) last week. I told you that phrasal verbs can be difficult because there are many different meanings. Today we'll look at one phrasal verb that has many meanings. Last week, we learned "put off" meaning to delay something. EX: I put off doing my homework because I hate homework.

Today's phrasal verb is "put on". Some phrasal verbs can have a noun or pronoun between the verb and adverb. For example, "put **it** off".

**PUT ON:** Read the sentences and tell what you think the phrasal verb, "put on" means in each sentence.

1. I **put on** my new dress and danced around the room.
2. Eric forgot to **put sunscreen on**. Now he has a sunburn. (Note: You can also say, "Eric forgot to **put on** sunscreen.)
3. My neighbors **put a new roof on** their house. (OR: My neighbor **put on** a new roof.)
4. Please **put the book on** the table.
5. I **put on weight** at Christmas because I eat too many sweets.
6. The children **put on** a concert for the new teachers.
7. Are you **putting me on** or are you telling the truth? (Note: Another word for putting someone on is "teasing". Do you like to tease people?)

## **RUN INTO**

1. Al was driving too fast and he **ran into** a telephone pole.
2. We **ran into** Maggie downtown. We asked her to join us for lunch. (We also say, "bump into" to mean the same thing.)
3. I was trying to repair my car myself. But I **ran into** problems when I took the engine apart.
4. My car is very old. Fixing all the broken parts of my car would **run into** thousands of dollars.

## **RUN OVER**
