

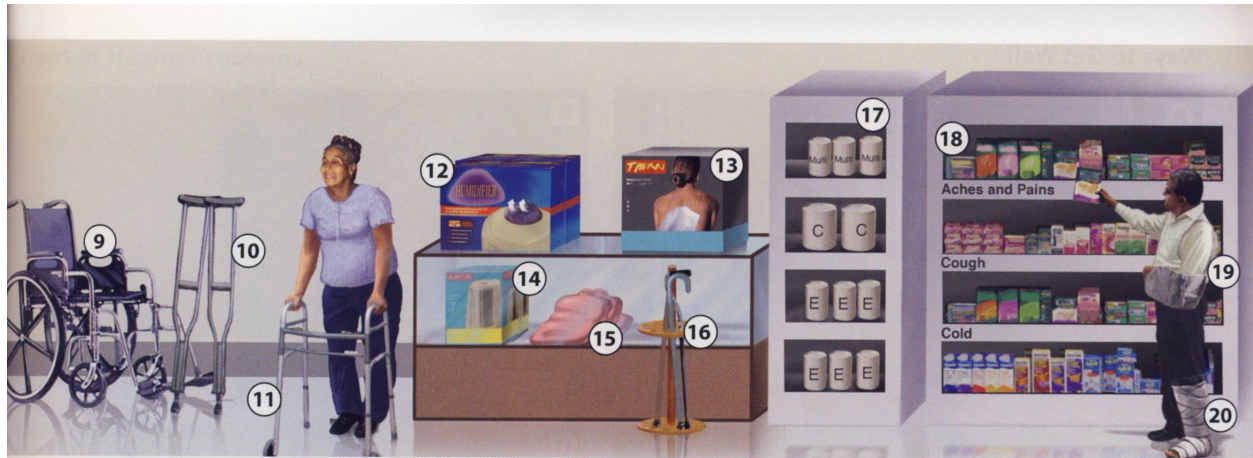

Practice these conversations. Answer the questions.

Dr. Smith: What **symptoms** do you have Mrs. Jones?

Mrs. Jones: My nose is **running**. I have a bad headache. My throat hurts when I **swallow**.

Dr. Smith: Have you been **running a fever**?

Mrs. Jones: I did not **take my temperature**, but I don't think so.

Dr. Smith: Open your mouth and **stick out your tongue**. Your throat looks red. Are you coughing?

Mrs. Jones: A little at night. I don't cough in the daytime.

Dr. Smith: Mrs. Jones, I don't think you have a cold or the flu. I think you have **allergies**. There is a lot of **cedar pollen** in the air right now. You should stay inside as much as you can. You can take Claritin. It is an **over the counter** allergy medication. It may help your symptoms. Drink plenty of water and get lots of rest. You will feel better when **cedar season** is over.

Mrs. Jones: Thank you doctor. But I have one question. My head is throbbing right now. What should I do?

Dr. Smith: I will ask the nurse to get you some Tylenol. We have some free samples you can take home with you.

Lara: I need to **pick up** my prescription.

Pharmacist: I have it **ready** for you. Here it is. Have you taken this medicine before? **Lara:** No, I haven't.

Pharmacist: The **dosage** is one tablet twice a day. You should take it with food. If you take it on an **empty stomach**, you might get **nauseous**.

Lara: I will take it with food. I don't want to **throw up**.

Pharmacist: The doctor also **prescribed** cough medicine. It is a liquid. The dosage says two **teaspoonfuls** at bedtime. The warning label says, "May Cause **Drowsiness**". Don't take this medicine if you plan to drive. It might make you fall asleep and have an accident.Do you have any questions?

Lara: No, I understand. Thank you.

Questions:

- 1.Did Lara take this medicine before?
- 2.How many tablets does Lara take each day?
- 3.Why will she take the medicine with food?
- 4.When will Lara take cough medicine?
- 5.What does the warning label say?
- 6.Can she drive if she takes the cough medicine?

Teachers: Be sure to ask the students if there are words in the table that they don't know. If extra time, ask them to choose a word and make a sentence with it.
