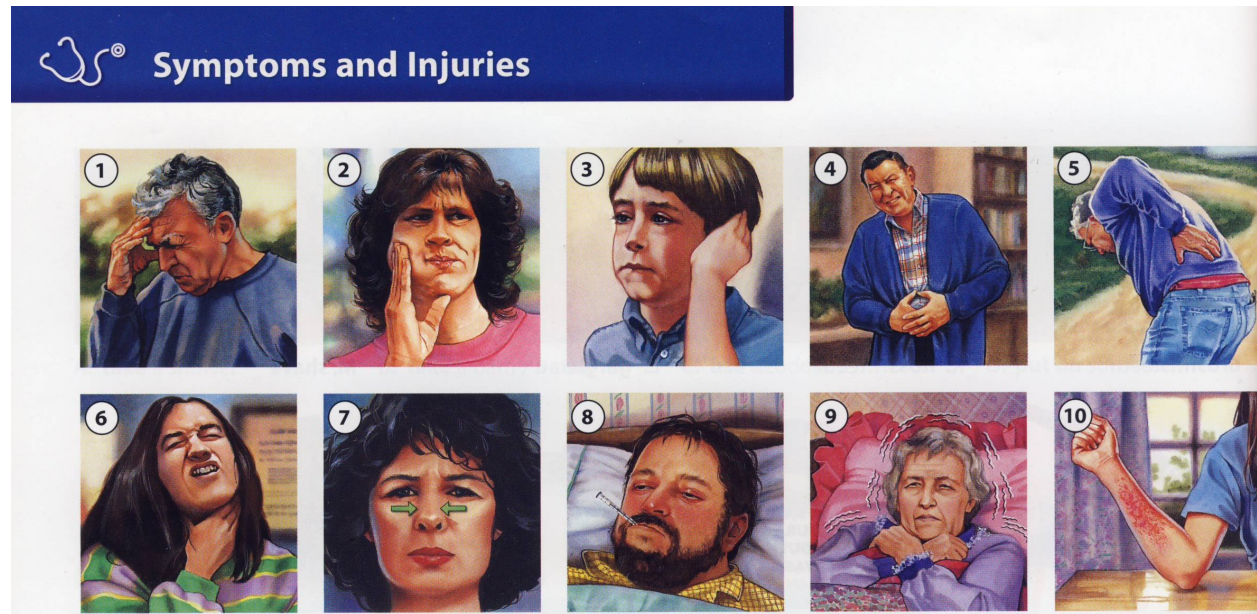
What do you like to eat?

HEALTH DISCUSSIONS

In addition to worrying about getting COVID, many people worry about having a cold or the flu. Do you worry about getting sick? Study these symptoms below.



Students read each paragraph. Teachers, make sure they understand the words and phrases in bold text. Ask for questions.

1-This man has a **headache**. His head **aches**. Maybe he will take some **aspirin**. I like to drink a glass of wine with dinner. But sometimes it gives me a headache. What gives you a headache?

2-This woman's tooth hurts. She has a **toothache**. She might have to see a **dentist**. She might need her tooth **pulled**.

3-This boy's ear hurts. He has an **earache**. He will need medicine for his ear. Have you ever had an earache?

4-This man's **stomach** hurts. He has a **stomachache**. Maybe he ate some bad food. Maybe he has **food poisoning**. Have you ever had food poisoning?

5-This man hurt his back. He has a **backache**. He shouldn't **lift** heavy things. Lifting heavy things could hurt his back. Are you careful about lifting heavy things?

6-This woman has a **sore throat**. (We **don't** call this a throatache.) Her throat looks red.

7-This woman has **nasal congestion**. Nasal means nose. She has a **stuffy nose**. Her nose is **stopped up**. It feels full. She will try to **blow her nose**. Sometimes people have a **runny nose**. They have to **wipe their nose** with a **kleenex**. They have lots of **mucus** in their nose. A slang word for mucus is **snot**.

8-This man has a **thermometer** in his mouth. Maybe he has **fever**. Or we could say, he has a **temperature**. We talk about someone "**running a fever**". That means they have a temperature over 98.6 degrees. Doctors often ask if you had a fever. If your temperature is above 102, you have a **high fever**. If you call a doctor because your child is sick, the doctor will always ask if they have fever. It is a good idea to **take their temperature** before you call the doctor.

9-This woman has the **flu**. She has **chills**. She is **shivering** and feels cold.

10-This person has a **rash**. Maybe he is **allergic** to something. The woods around Austin are full of **poison ivy**. If you touch the leaf, you will get an **itchy rash**. You should not **scratch** the rash. If you scratch the rash, it could cause **infection**.

Poison ivy grows near the ground. It can also climb up a tree. The leaves have a poisonous oil that causes a very itchy rash. If you have touched poison ivy, wash with soap and water as soon as possible. If you get the oil from poison ivy on your hand and don't wash, you can spread it to other places on your body. So, please wash your hands.



Poison ivy leaves grow in clusters of 3, usually with one larger leaf on the end of the stem and two slightly smaller leaves beside it. The leaves are green in summer and turn red in the fall. Have you ever gotten poison ivy on your skin?
