

## **FUMC ESL 4-4-2024 High Beginning and Low Intermediate Lesson**

**NO CLASS on MONDAY, APRIL 8! Eclipse Day.**

**Introduce yourself. Tell where you are from and where you live now. Talk about something that makes you feel peaceful.**

### **Pronouncing Ending Consonants:**

Many languages do not have words that end in a consonant, so that can be hard for some students to hear. The teacher will say one of the sentence pairs below. You tell which one she said. (Some of these words end with a vowel, but the ending sound is a consonant sound.)

Teachers: Choose a sentence and read it at the normal rate. Don't slow it down the first time. (Obviously, mark the sentence you say so you'll remember when time to check comes.) Then when you are checking their answers, say both sentences slowly to help them hear. Then ask the students to pronounce the two sentence repeatedly.

1-What is the price?  
What is the prize?

2-Please bring your lab code.  
Please bring your lab coat.

3-Here's the tray.  
Here's the train.

4-Go to gate eight eleven.  
Go to gate A-11.

5-The cap was expensive.  
The cab was expensive.

6-This is my right.  
This is my ride.

7-Is your pay bad?  
Is your pain bad?

8-What's the day of the party?  
What's the date of the party?

9-Can the hostess see us?  
Can the hostess seat us?

10-Your red boat is nice.  
Your red bow is nice.

11-I don't like my team.  
I don't like my tea.

12-Did he say anything?  
Did he save anything?

13-Should I take the tie off?  
Should I take the time off?

### **USING SOME and ANY**

We use SOME in positive sentences. We use ANY in negative sentences.

#### **Read these examples:**

I am going to buy some clothes.

I didn't buy any clothes.

There is some milk in the refrigerator.

There isn't any milk in the refrigerator.

She made some mistakes.

She didn't make any mistakes.

**Put "some" or "any" in these sentences.**

1. There isn't \_\_\_\_\_ salt on the table.

In MOST questions, we use ANY not SOME. For example: Are there any cookies in the bowl?  
Do you have any friends here? Do you need any help?

We usually use SOME, not ANY if we offer something or if we ask for something. Read these examples.

Would you like some coffee?

Can I have some soup?

May I have some tea?

**Put "some" or "any" in these sentences.**

1. Are there \_\_\_\_\_ pens in this drawer? No, but there are \_\_\_\_\_ markers in there.
2. Are there \_\_\_\_\_ cookies left over from the party? Yes, there are \_\_\_\_\_ cookies right here.
3. Did you find \_\_\_\_\_ shoes that fit you? No, they didn't have \_\_\_\_\_ shoes in my size.
4. Can you lend me \_\_\_\_\_ money? I'm sorry, I don't have \_\_\_\_\_.
5. Did you check \_\_\_\_\_ bags? No, I didn't check \_\_\_\_\_.

Notice in some of the sentences above, you don't need to follow "some" or "any" with a noun. In sentences 4 and 5, the sentence ends with "any". You could say, "any money" or "any bags", but it isn't necessary.

**Read these examples:**

1. Mary took a lot of pictures, but I didn't take any.
2. The bananas weren't ripe, so I didn't buy any.
3. Do you need to borrow any warm clothes? No, thanks. I have some in my suitcase.

When you use "something, somebody, someone, anything, anybody or anyone" the rules are the same. EX: I saw something in the road. I didn't see anything in the road. (Anybody and Anyone mean the same. You can say, "I didn't see anyone" OR "I didn't see anybody.")
