Discuss:

1-The word **hostility** and **hospitality** come from the same root word in Latin which means stranger or guest. But hostility and hospitality have opposite meanings. Hostility means unfriendly and aggressive. Hospitality is friendliness to a stranger. If a stranger comes to your door, you can offer hostility or hospitality. Which of these, hostility or hospitality, have you experienced more often in the U.S.? When a stranger rings your doorbell at night, would you offer him hospitality or hostility?

2-We talk about "extending hospitality" to immigrants. By "extending", we mean reaching out and offering welcome. Is your country hostile to immigrants or do they reach out to offer hospitality?

3- **Hostel** and **hospital** come from this same latin root. A hostel was a place to stay. A hospital was originally a shelter for the needy. But the word evolved into a place where sick people were taken care of. Youth hostels are popular in Europe. Young people who are traveling can rent a bed in a youth hostel for a cheap price. Have you ever stayed in a youth hostel?

4-Most babies in America are born in hospitals. But some mothers elect to have a home birth. Some mothers hire a midwife to help with the delivery of a baby. What do you think about this? Is it safe for babies to be born at home? What are the pros and cons to home birth?

5- **Hospice** is an organization that provides care for terminally ill people. If a person was very sick and people expected them to die, they would call hospice and they would help care for them. Do you have a similar program in your country? Who cares for terminally ill people in your country?
