Introduce yourself

GRAMMAR: Is "have got" correct English? Yes for certain situations. "Have got" is used in informal English speech. It means exactly the same as "have" in the situations below. We don't ever use "do" with got. EX: I do not got any friends. This is WRONG. Use "I do not have any friends. OR I haven't got any friends.

1. We use "have got" to talk about things we own.

EX: We have a house in southern France. OR We have got a house in southern France.
He has a new car. OR He's got a new car. (He's is the short form for "he has".)
Do you have a minute to talk? OR Have you got a minute to talk?
I don't have time right now. OR I haven't got time right now.
I have an idea. OR I've got an idea.

2. We use "have got" to talk about family and relationships.

EX: I have a new boyfriend. OR I've got a new boyfriend.
Mike doesn't have any brothers. OR Mike hasn't got any brothers.
Do you have any children? OR Have you got any children?

3. We use "have got" to talk about physical characteristics.

EX: Carol has brown eyes. OR Carol's got brown eyes.
Does your sister have long hair. OR Has your sister got brown hair.

4. We use "have got" to talk about illness.

EX: I have a bad cold. OR I've got a bad cold.
Do you have the flu? OR Have you got the flu?

5. We use "have got" to talk about plans.

EX: I have to catch the bus now. OR I've got to catch the bus now.
I have to study for my test. OR I've got to study for my test.

We don't use "have got" in the past tense. EX: I had got new shoes, but I returned them. You can say "I got new shoes, but I returned them." Leave out the "had". NOT I had got the flu last week. Instead use, "I had the flu last week." OR "I got the flu last week.

A: Dan's family has got a lot of money. His mom always worries some girl will find out he's rich and try to *get her hooks into him*.

B: What does Dan think?

A: He says he's got to be careful. He doesn't want someone who dates him because he's rich.

B: (laughing) I have never had that worry. Any girl who dates me, does it for my personality and good looks because I'm *dead broke*.

A: My friend got caught *shoplifting*. They caught him with expensive jewelry in his pockets.

B: He'll need a good lawyer to get him *off the hook* for that. *Why in the world* would he shoplift?

A: He's got a lot of problems. His wife is disabled and can't work. He's got to pay for childcare for his kids and a caregiver for his wife while he's at work.

B: That's a poor excuse.
